OAKLAND, May 12.— Practically complete returns tabulated at mid-night show that John L. Davie has been elected Mayor of Oakland over Frank W. Bilger by a majority of 10,000 votes.

Davie will carry into office with him W. H. Edwards as Commissioner No. 1 and Dr. F. F. Jackson as Commissioner No. 2, thus giving him control of the City Commission.

The campaign was one of the liveliest in Oakland's history. Davie had a majority over all candidates at the primaries and despite a very aggressive fight Bilger was unable to overcome this lead.

On the other hand William R. Geary and Edwin Meese, who were defeated for Commissioners, had big leads at the primaries and during the campaign made every effort to increase their following.

Edwards and Jackson, who defeated them, were indorsed by Davie, who declared that if a commission was elected that opposed him his hands would be tied and it would be impossible for him to carry out his policies. It is believed that this argument was one of the chief factors in the voters reversing their prefences as expressed at the primaries. VOTES AGAINST JITNEYS.

Oakland also went on record yesterday as not being favorably inclined toward the jitney busses, voting against an amendment favored by the Jitney drivers was to reduce their annual license from \$60 to \$10.
